INTERROGATIONS	Administrators, teachers, and other professional personnel may
BY SCHOOL OFFICIALS	question a student regarding the student's own conduct or the con- duct of other students. In the context of school discipline, students have no claim to the right not to incriminate themselves.
BY POLICE OR OTHER AUTHORITIES	For provisions pertaining to student questioning by law enforce- ment officials or other lawful authorities, see GRA(LOCAL).
LOCKERS AND VEHICLES	Students have full responsibility for the security of their lockers, and for vehicles parked on school property. It is the student's re- sponsibility to ensure that lockers and vehicles are locked and that the keys and combinations are not given to others. Students shall not place, keep, or maintain any article or material that is forbidden by District policy in lockers or in vehicles parked on school prop- erty.
	School officials may search lockers, or vehicles parked on school property, if there is reasonable cause to believe that they contain articles or materials prohibited by District policy. Students shall be responsible for any prohibited items found in their lockers or in ve- hicles parked on school property.
	If a vehicle subject to search is locked, the student shall be asked to unlock the vehicle. If the student refuses, the District shall con- tact the student's parents. If the parents also refuse to permit a search of the vehicle, the District may turn the matter over to local law enforcement officials.
USE OF TRAINED DOGS	The District shall use specially trained nonaggressive dogs to sniff out and alert officials to the current presence of concealed prohib- ited items, illicit substances defined in FNCF(LEGAL), and alcohol. This program is implemented in response to drug- and alcohol- related problems in District schools, with the objective of maintain- ing a safe school environment conducive to education.
	Such visits to schools shall be unannounced. The dogs shall be used to sniff vacant classrooms, vacant common areas, the areas around student lockers, and the areas around vehicles parked on school property. The dogs shall not be used with students. If a dog alerts to a locker, a vehicle, or an item in a classroom, it may be searched by school officials. Searches of vehicles shall be conducted as described above.

PARENT NOTIFICATION	The student's parent or guardian shall be notified if any prohibited articles or materials are found in a student's locker, in a student's vehicle parked on school property, or on the student's person, as a result of a search conducted in accordance with this policy.		
USE OF METAL DETECTORS	The District shall use hand-held magnetometers ("metal detectors' to discover and deter violations of the District's weapons policy [see FNCG] and to deter students from bringing weapons to school.	')	
NOTICE	Students shall be notified at the beginning of each school year at a student assembly and in the student handbook that students will b subject both to random administrative and individualized reasonable suspicion searches by school employees using hand-held metal detectors to prevent and deter students from bringing prohibited weapons to school. The student handbook shall contain a summary of this policy. Signs will be posted at each entrance and in the school lobby to advise students that each student may be required to submit to a screening for metal as a condition of entering or continuing attendance at school.	)-	
OPERATOR	The person(s) operating the magnetometer(s) shall be specially trained in the use of the unit(s) in order to maximize the effective- ness of the search.		
RANDOM ADMINISTRATION SEARCHES OF STUDENTS	Because the very presence of weapons represents an overwhelm- ing threat to the safety and well-being of all persons in the school setting, and because the scope of the search is so specific and nonintrusive, magnetometers may be used to search students se- lected on a random basis.		
	Prior to each magnetometer scanning, the employee conducting the search shall ask the student to place any bags or parcels on a table and to remove all metal objects from his or her pockets, and		
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	begi ally be s	employee shall then "scan" the student with the metal detector inning at the toes and continuing up to the head, without actu- touching the body. The student's bags and parcels shall then scanned. A student shall be scanned by an employee of the le sex as the student.
NONRANDOM SEARCHES OF STUDENTS	A particular student shall be singled out to be searched with a magnetometer only if there exists a reasonable suspicion that the individual to be searched possesses a prohibited weapon. In all cases, the procedure set forth above shall be followed.

	1.	Allow students to enter only through specified entrances. All students are searched daily as they enter the building.
	2.	On day one, search all students entering into classrooms A-E, on day two, search all students entering into classrooms F-J, etc.
	3.	Allow students to enter only at special times and only through specified entrances. Search all students on randomly selected days as they enter the building.
	4.	Search all students arriving through a particular entrance (e.g., the north and west entrances).

DRUG TESTING POLICY	The District requires drug testing of any student in grades 6–12 who chooses to participate in school-sponsored extracurricular ac- tivities and any student who applies for an on-campus parking permit. In addition, any student who chooses to participate on a voluntary basis may do so.

Drug test results shall not be maintained with a student's academic record. Results shall not be otherwise dis- closed except as required by law.
TESTING LABORATORY	The Board shall contract with a certified drug-testing laboratory to conduct testing of students' urine samples.
	Testing laboratories shall not release statistics regarding the rate of positive drug tests to any person or organization without consent of the District.

COLLECTION PROCEDURES	Personnel from the drug-testing laboratory shall collect urine sam- ples under conditions that are no more intrusive than the conditions experienced in a public restroom. When selected for testing, a student shall be escorted to the school's testing site <b>by a campus</b> <b>principal or designee of the same gender as the student who</b> <b>shall remain under that employee's supervision until the stu- dent provides a sample. Samples shall be produced by the</b>
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	student from behind a closed restroom stall. The principal or designee of the same gender as the student shall be present when any samples are collected.
RANDOM TESTING	Random tests shall be conducted on as many as 20 dates throughout the school year.
	No less than five percent and no more than 20 percent of the stu- dents participating in the program shall be randomly selected for each random test date.
	The drug-testing laboratory shall use a random selection method to identify students chosen for random testing. Students shall not receive prior notice of the testing date or time.
REFUSAL TO TEST OR TAMPERING	A student who refuses to be tested when selected or who is deter- mined to have tampered with a sample shall be deemed to have a positive test result and shall be subject to the appropriate conse- quences depending on previous positive test results, if any.
	If a student is absent on the day of the random test, a sample shall be collected on the next random testing date.
POSITIVE TEST RESULTS	An initial positive test shall be confirmed by a second test of the same specimen before being reported as positive.
	Upon receiving results of a positive drug test, the District shall schedule a meeting with the student, the student's parent if the student is under the age of 18, and the coach or sponsor of the ex- tracurricular activity to review the test results and discuss conse- quences.
	The student or parent shall have five school days following the meeting to provide a medical explanation for a positive result.
CONSEQUENCES	Consequences of positive test results shall be cumulative through the student's enrollment in junior high school and shall begin anew for high school as follows: A student in junior high school who has up to three offenses shall begin anew in high school; however, a student in junior high who commits a fourth of- fense shall have the second and third junior high offenses counted as the first high school offense.
	A student who has a confirmed positive drug test shall be subject to the following consequences:
FIRST OFFENSE	The student shall be suspended from any extracurricular activity for 15 school days following the date the student and parent are noti- fied of the test results.

	During the period of suspension, the student shall not be permitted to participate in practices.
DRUG ABUSE PREVENTION	The District shall notify the parent and student of drug and alcohol abuse prevention resources available in the area. The student shall be required to complete an assessment by an approved licensed chemical dependency counselor approved by the District, and complete the program recommended by the counselor. Attendance shall be monitored. Failure to attend shall result in ineligibility until the program has been com- pleted.
SECOND OFFENSE	The student shall be suspended from any extracurricular activity for 30 school days following the date the student and parent are noti- fied of the test results.
	The District shall again notify the parent and student of drug and alcohol abuse prevention resources available in the area. The student shall be required to complete an assessment by an approved licensed chemical dependency counselor approved by the District, and complete the program recommended by the counselor. Attendance shall be monitored. Failure to at- tend shall result in ineligibility until the program has been completed.
THIRD AND SUBSEQUENT OFFENSES	The student shall be suspended from participation in any extracur- ricular activity for 180 school days following the date the student and parent are notified of the test results. The student shall be required to complete an assessment by an approved licensed chemical dependency counselor approved by the District, and complete the program recommended by the counselor. At- tendance shall be monitored. Failure to attend shall result in ineligibility until the program has been completed.
END-OF-SEMESTER SUSPENSIONS	If a student's suspension from participation is not completed by the end of the semester, the student shall complete the assigned pe- riod of suspension during the following semester or during the first semester of the following school year.
	During <b>any</b> period of suspension, the student shall not be permit- ted to participate in practices.
RETESTING	If the student wishes to return to participation in extracurricu- lar activities after a period of suspension under this policy, the student must be retested at the end of the period of suspen- sion and have a negative test result or a test result that is consistent with no further use of the prohibited substance pursuant to the data analysis protocols and standards of the

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### testing laboratory. The student shall be retested on the next two random test dates.

APPEALS A student or parent may appeal a decision made under this policy in accordance with FNG(LOCAL). The student shall be ineligible for participation in extracurricular activities while the appeal is pending.
